Dr Chris Batchelor, the Director of Music at St Pancras Church, writes:

For those of you, regular members and visitors, looking for something a little more traditional at this time we hope this is helpful:

For millennia hymns have provided signposts within the liturgy as well opportunities for us all to stand up and take an active role in worship. We all know, of course, how much we might sing hymns in our heads long after we have left a service. And this sense, perhaps, of unseen fellowship, is much where we are at the moment. By no means all hymns stick in your head, thankfully.

Henry Smart was considered one of the foremost organists of his day (1813-1879). In 1864 St Pancras Church, despite having an instrument which was thought to be adequate, installed a much larger replacement, guided by Smart, who then went on to become organist at the church until his death. His contribution to the hymnody repertoire was not on the scale of such as Dykes and Monk, but the quality of his work speaks across the years, with such well-known examples as Light's abode, celestial Salem (Regent Square), Son of God, eternal Saviour (Everton) and See the Conqueror mounts in triumph (Rex Gloriae).

Sadly, Smart did not write any great Holy Week and Easter hymns, so my brief Passiontide journey is accompanied by examples by others. Currently we are talking of virtual communities etc, but before I get on with the music, imagine what it was like in St Pancras Church, with the existing galleries full, and the pauper galleries which extended on each side of the organ right up to the ceiling.
